

Just like musical statues, but with a twist. When the music stops, hold up an object and ask your child to tell you the initial sound (first sound in the word) For example 'c for cat' or 'p for pan'.

MONDAY

Today we are going to be learning...

How to Segment the sounds in a word



Explain that today we are going to be segmenting a word- What does segmenting mean?

TEACH:

Segmenting is when you break up a word into its individual sounds. When we segment we use our robot arms, moving them up and down each time we say a sound.

Model segmenting the word 'd-o-g' Can you segment the word dog now?



PLAY: Use a sound puppet to tell sounds in sound-talk
You will need a puppet and objects with three sounds

Have a puppet and a bag of simple objects, each with three sounds in their

names, e.g. a pin, a dog and a pig.







The puppet picks out an object and the children try to say the name of the item in sound talk. For example, the pin would be 'p-i-n.

Extension: Introduce 4 phoneme objects for your child to segment- frog or book

TUESDAY

Today we are going to be learning...


How to Segment the sounds in a word



RECAP:

What can you tell me about segmenting?

Can you show me how to segment the word pot?











Tell the children that today we are going to go on a hunt for some objects.

Tell the children the objects they are looking for provide pictures or a list of objects.

Allow your child to search for an object and when found they have to segment it clearly to the adult. E.g we are looking for a coat, a cat, a pot, a spoon, a dish.

Extension: Let the children take reigns and segment an item for you to find!

WEDNESDAY

Today we are going to be learning...

How to Segment the sounds in a word



RECAP:

Segmenting - Can you remember what segmenting is? (breaking up a word into separate sounds)

Can you snap like a crocodile and segment the word boat?

PLAY: Cross the river

Have a selection of there letter objects (e.g. a 'can', a 'pig' and a 'bag') Have a 'river' on floor, such as a piece of blue material.

One at a time the children have to segment their object, e.g. 'c-a-n', to be able to jump over the river. To make it easier practice saying all of the objects like robots before you begin the game.





Extension: Why not have trickier objects to segment.

THURSDAY

Today we are going to be learning...

How to Segment the sounds in a word



RECAP:

Recap blending (squashing a word back together) and segmenting (breaking up a word into separate sounds)

Can you leap like a frog and segment the

word rat?

PLAY: Feed the monkey

It doesn't necessarily need to be a monkey in this activity; any other toy would work well also.

Have some toy or real food and a picnic basket/box next to the toy. Say to the children that the monkey can only put the food in his hamper if we can say it in sound-talk, e.g. j-a-m. Jam!

Good foods to use in this game are things like ham, eggs, cake, milk and cheese.





Extension:

If children are getting good at these simpler words, however, why not have a go at longer words, for example 'sandwich'!

FRIDAY

Recap segmenting (breaking up a word into separate sounds)


Can you segment man:




PLAY: Jump the planets

In this game you are going to draw three circles in a row on the ground. These could be planets, or they could be lily pads, or currant buns or something else if you prefer.

The children pick a CVC picture/object out of a bag, e.g. 'cup'. Then the children are going to jump across the planets, saying one sound each time they land on a planet – e.g. 'C-u-p.' Then they jump off the last planet into space and say the word, in this example 'cup.'





Extension:

If children are getting good at these simpler words, why not have a go at longer 4 letter words and add an extra planet.
