





Read and seek

Adult to write out words, such as: hard, green, brown, red, flat, long, soft, black and sparkling.

Can you read the words and find an object, that matches the word? For example, for green, you might find a leaf, a green apple or green socks!

Musical Sounds

Like musical statues! Play some music and encourage your child to dance/move around. Stop the music and show your child a phoneme. Can they tell you what it is, as quick as a flash? You could also play this game with the tricky words that your child has learnt so far!

Flash cards — speed trial

Can you look carefully at the different graphemes shown on screen and say the phoneme (sound) it makes, as quick as a flash? How quickly can you say all phase 3 sounds? Can you play the game again later in the week and beat your time? https://www.phonicsplay.co.uk/member-only/Flashcards.html

Simon says

Similar to normal 'Simon says'. Adult to give instructions by segmenting the sounds. For example, 'Simon says can you r-u-n' or 'Simon says can you jump up h-igh'. Children to blend the sounds and complete the instruction (run, hop, jump, skip, shake, sit, dig, nod, hug).

Bowling

Collect some different sized containers or bottles, and on each one write/stick a grapheme (letter shape), or tricky word. Can you bowl a ball, or something similar to knock down the containers? Can you say the sounds (phoneme), or tricky words on the containers that you knocked down?



Beat the timer

Adult/child to write out previously learned tricky words, or sounds (phonemes), onto separate pieces of paper and lay them face down. Adult to set a timer, or count down from a number. How many can you read correctly, before the timer runs out?


Tricky word bingo

Roll and write

For this activity you will need to use a dice, or create number cards 1-6 (interactive dice can be found online, if you do not have one at home).



First, you will need to roll the dice and look at the number that it lands on. Then, have a look at the grid on the next page. If you rolled number 1, you would look at the picture in that column. Your challenge is to look carefully at the picture and name it. Can you write the word, that matches to the picture?

Challenge yourself to write at least 10 different words. Remember to segment the sounds to help you and listen carefully, for the consonant clusters.







- 1. Say your sentence. Count how many words in your sentence.
- 2. Start with a capital letter.
- 3. Write one word at a time, by segmenting the sounds.
- 4. Remember finger spaces.
- 5. Full stop at the end.
- 6. Read it back, does it make sense?


The Pink Pig

Cluster spinning tops

Adult/child to write the following consonant clusters, onto separate pieces of paper and place them in different locations, around the room.

• tr, dr, st, cr

Adult to call out some of the following words. Each word, starts with one of the consonant clusters that you have placed around the room. Can you listen carefully, segment the sounds in the words and work out which cluster is at the start? Can you run/spin towards the piece of paper, that has the consonant cluster written on it?

For example - if your adult calls out crab, you would need to find the 'cr' cluster.

Words: tree, stop, drink, trip, trap, crab, star, tram, drop, start, step, crush.

Writing a comic strip

Using the template on the next slide, can you write your own comic, using the pictures to help you?

Before you begin, tell your adult about each of the different pictures and think carefully about a sentence you could write for each. Use these questions to help you:

Who is in the picture? Where are they? What is happening?


Remember our steps for success too. These can be found on the next slide, alongside the comic.

Introducing a new reading challenge!

Each Friday, our learning will focus around a reading challenge. For this challenge, you must become a reading detective! A reading detective is someone who answers lots of different questions about their reading. To do so, they:



Use their phonics knowledge to read words and sentences.



Think carefully about what they have read.



Make predictions (a sensible guess) about what might happen.



Look at the pictures for clues and ideas.

<u>Adults</u> - This learning will encourage and support your child's reading comprehension/understanding of the text. Each week, there will be a given number of pages from a book, or another form of text, included at the end of each weekly PowerPoint.

Please encourage your child to:

- 1. Read the text on the pages provided.
- Read the questions. (Please encourage your child to read the questions themselves too. They may need support with certain words, which will be highlighted in red.)
 Answer the questions, using their reading detective skills.

It would be great if you could record your child's reading and responses to the questions, and upload them as a video, to the evidence me app. This way, we can hear exactly how your child is answering the questions. Thank you! ©


