2. English – Look at the picture to the right. Imagine this character is going to be the main character in your next story. Write a paragraph describing the character. Remember when you are describing a character you need to tell the reader not only what they look like but what type of person they are. Are they going to be a good person or a bad person? What do they like to do in their spare time? Why are they wearing what those clothes? The aim when writing a character description is to be able to take the picture away and the reader will still be able to picture a character similar to the one you described. In your character description you must include adjectives. You could also use similes to add interest and adverbs to describe how they do things. Remember you are not writing a story, just describing the character. Make sure you



check your punctuation (capital letters, full stops, exclamation marks and commas) and spelling when you have finished.

3. Maths – We are going to be looking at fractions. We have looked at a half, quarter, three quarters, a third and a whole. Can you remember how they are written? Remember how many you have is on the top and what it is divided into is on the bottom. So for ½ you have one piece out of two. Have a go at the following questions on fractions.
