



Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised

Our school has chosen

Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised as our systematic, synthetic phonics (SSP) programme to teach early reading and spelling.

- *Support all children to become fluent, confident readers
- *Increase the number of children working at the age related expectation in word reading by the Phonics Screening Check
- *Increase opportunities for children to develop a love of reading at home, through story telling and listening to reading role models
- *Train all staff who work with children during the school day
- *Provide opportunities to support children who need a little extra guidance and support

Reception and Year 1 overviews

This programme overview shows the progression of GPCs and tricky words that we teach term-by-term. The progression has been organised so that children are taught from the simple to more complex GPCs, as well as taking into account the frequency of their occurrence in the most commonly encountered words. All the graphemes taught are practised in words, sentences, and later on, in fully decodable books. Children review and revise GPCs and words, daily, weekly and across terms and years, in order to move this knowledge into their long term memory.

Children need to learn to read as quickly as reasonably possible, so they can move from learning to read, to reading to learn, giving them access to the treasure house of reading. Our expectations of progression are aspirational yet achievable if schools maintain pace, practice and participation by all children. Children who are not keeping-up with their peers should be given additional practice immediately through keep-up sessions.

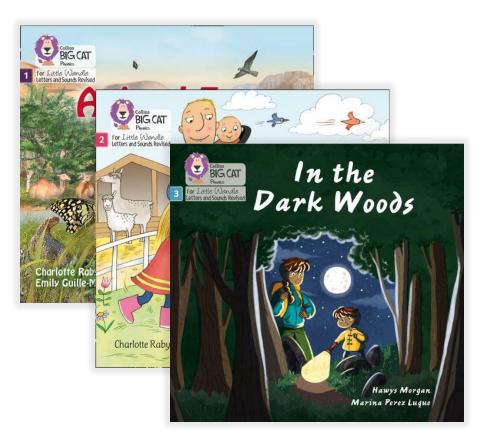


Reading at home

We use assessment to match your child the right level of book





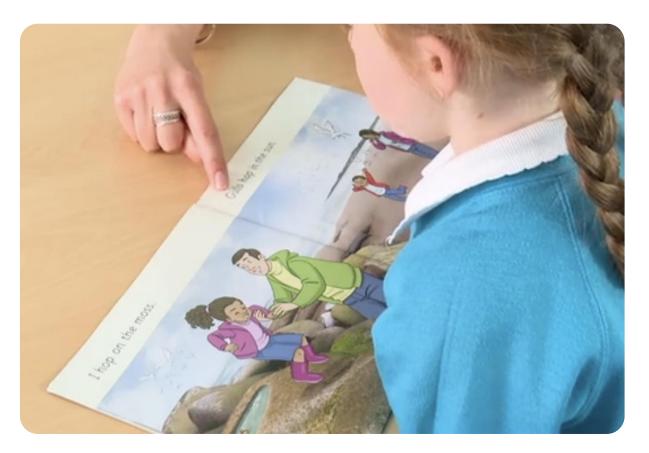


Reading a book at the right level



This means that your child should:


- Know all the sounds and tricky words in their phonics book well
- Read many of the words by silent blending (in their head) – their reading will be automatic
- Only need to stop and sound out about 5% of the words by the time they bring the book home – but they should be able to do this on their own.



How do we teach reading in books?

Reading practice sessions are:

- timetabled three times a week
- taught by a trained teacher/teaching assistant
- taught in small groups.
- Once children have read 3x times at school, the book will be assigned on the e-library to complete a 'Celebratory Read' at home.











The most important thing you can do is read with your child

Reading a book and chatting had a positive impact a year later on children's ability to...

- understand words and sentences
- use a wide range of vocabulary
- develop listening comprehension skills.

The amount of books children were exposed to by age 6 was a positive predictor of their reading ability two years later.



Reading Expectations in Reception

- Log in to the e-library once weekly, to complete the 'celebratory read'
- Sign your child's reading diary
- Share the Little Wandle home learning sheet with your child, to recap the sounds that we have been practising in school.
- Share a library book, at least 3 times weekly. Record this in your child's reading diary.
- Sign your child's reading diary when you have shared a story or listened to their reading.
