

The Scarborough reading rope

Phonics is:

making connections between the sounds
of our spoken words and the letters that
are used to write them down.



Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised



Support all children to become fluent, confident readers

- * Increase the number of children working at the age related expectation in word reading by the Phonics Screening Check
- * Increase opportunities for children to develop a love of reading at home, through story telling and listening to reading role models
- * Train all staff who work with children during the school day
- * Provide opportunities to support children who need a little extra guidance and support using the 'keep up' programme.


Reading

How do we teach reading in books?



Reading practice sessions are:

- timetabled three times a week
- taught by a trained teacher/teaching assistant
- taught in small groups.
- Once children have read 3x times at school, the book will be assigned on the e-library to complete a 'Celebratory Read' at home.



We use assessment to match your child the right level of book

Reading a book at the right level

This means that your child should:

- Know all the sounds and tricky words in their phonics book well
- Read many of the words by silent blending (in their head) – their reading will be automatic
- Only need to stop and sound out about 5% of the words by the time they bring the book home – but they should be able to do this on their own.





Reading at home

The most important thing you can do is read with your child



Research shows that reading a book and chatting about it has a positive impact on your child's ability to...

- understand words and sentences
- use a wide range of vocabulary
- develop listening comprehension skills.


The amount of books children are exposed to by age 6 is a positive predictor of their reading ability two years later.




Books going home



Collins ebooks



Initially, we are using the e-library to send home the decodable book for the 'Celebratory Read'. Please see the letter on the next slide that details how we are planning to increase book stock.



Reading Expectations in Year One



- Log in to the e-library once weekly, to complete the ‘celebratory read’
- Sign your child’s reading diary
- Share the Little Wandle home learning sheet with your child, to recap the sounds that we have been practising in school.
- Share a library book, at least 3 times weekly. Record this in your child’s reading diary.
- Sign your child’s reading diary when you have shared a story or listened to their reading.



Listening to your child read their phonics book

- Your child should be able to read their book without your help.
- If they can't read a word read it to them.
- Talk about the book and celebrate their success.



Read to your child



The shared (or library) book is for YOU to read:

- Make the story sound as exciting as you can by changing your voice.
- Talk with your child as much as you can:
 - Introduce new and exciting language
 - Encourage your child to use new vocabulary
 - Make up sentences together
 - Find different words to use
 - Describe things you see.



How we can support you, to support your child at home...



- The lending library is available in the school hall from 8.30am, every Tuesday. The bags have been purchased from a specialist Early Years company and contain high quality texts with matching resources.
- Every Thursday, we will continue to host a Reading Breakfast from 8.30am. Come in from the winter weather, log on to the e-library on the iPads or you can read the paper-based phonics book.
