What is expected by the end of KS2?

- You will be given your child's raw score (the actual number of marks they get), alongside their scaled score and whether they have reached the national average.
- A scaled score of 100 is the benchmark for reaching ARE (age related expectations).
- A score of 110 or greater indicates that the child has demonstrated a greater depth of understanding.
- The raw score needed to reach ARE varies each year and is announced after the SATs have been completed.

Key Stage 2 Reading

The reading test is a single paper containing three different texts from a range of genres. child will have one hour, including reading time, to complete the test.

There will be a selection of question types, including:

- Ranking/ordering, e.g. 'Number the events below to show the order in which they happen in the story'
- Labelling, e.g. 'Label the text to show the title of the story'
- Find and copy, e.g. 'Find and copy one word that suggests what the weather is like in the story'
- Short constructed response, e.g. 'What does the bear eat?'
- Open-ended response, e.g. 'Look at the sentence that begins *Once upon a time*. How does the writer increase the tension throughout this paragraph? Explain fully, referring to the text in your answer.'

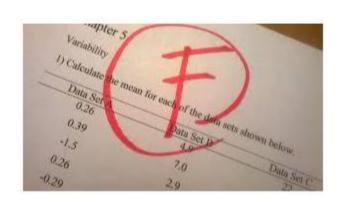
Checking answers

- Develop skills needed to check answers
- Encourage children to actually re-do the calculation
- Give children examples where mistakes have been made. Let the children mark it. Can they spot and correct the mistakes?

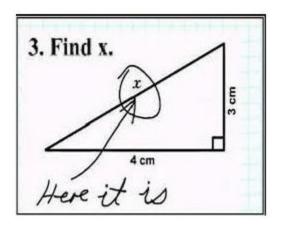
Common errors

- Missing out the correct unit of measurement in the answer
- General presentation final answer not being clear
- Numbers not clearly formed e.g. '0' looking like a '6'
- Decimal points missing them out or making them look like a comma
- 2 step problems make sure children follow the whole question through
- Recording the monetary values incorrectly e.g. must be £8.90 not £8.9

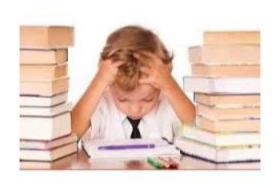

The dangers of reading too much into a test score!!

- It may send the message 'my intelligence is fixed'
- This may lead to 'why bother trying?' or 'I must look clever.'
- The result tells us nothing about potential— 'the capacity to develop my skills with effort over time.'
- But tests are a reality. How should we approach them?

Adopt a 'Growth Mindset'

When supporting your child at home do...

- Praise effort.
- Praise their efforts to memorise.
- Praise their efforts to recall what they already know.
- Praise their efforts to practise.
- Praise their efforts to struggle and find ways to the answer.
- Praise persistence.
- Provide them opportunities for quality down time away from screens.

- Tell your child 'I was no good at Maths/Writing/Reading/Tests either'-it sends a message that intelligence is fixed.

Talents and giftedness are starting points but effort is still required.

Encourage your child to think:

- I will work harder
- I will organise my time better
- I will practise
- I will ask for help
