# Suggested Reading for Year 11 and Sixth Form

## Introduction

Did you know that, according to a University of Oxford study,

"reading books is the only out-of-school activity for 16-year olds that is linked to getting a managerial or professional job later in life"

and according to a University of London study,

"reading for pleasure is more important for children's cognitive development than their parents' level of education and is a more powerful factor in life achievement than socio-economic background."

Yet, library borrowing statistics in our own and other secondary schools show a marked decline in average loans per student as they move up through the school. It's not too late!

This list is meant as a starting point. They are suggestions only, to provide some inspiration, and to bring to your attention books that you may not otherwise seek out or be aware of. Not all of them are massively challenging – you can gain a lot of pleasure from reading books that can also be enjoyed by younger readers. Neither are all the books for everyone – remember that your reading choices are personal to you.

Use the books suggested to explore others written by the same author. Try books from each genre: you never know what you might enjoy, and remember that very few books fall into one genre only.
