#### **CLASS OF '93**

A sunny Saturday in October saw former students and staff come together for a special 30-year reunion.

Together, they enjoyed afternoon tea, live music performances from current students and tours of the school. All who came said they were impressed by the new buildings and state-of-the-art facilities. There were photos, memorabilia, powerpoint presentations and the opportunity to sing the school song again.

Huge thanks go to Alison Morgan and Janice Kent (formerly Rees) who worked tirelessly to contact as may people as possible from the year group. There were over 100 former students invited to the reunion and Janice managed to contact 43 former teachers, of which 23 attended.

Janice says: "Thank you so much for attending and making the day so special. I hope it has rekindled friendships and we will meet again before too long."

Emma Kilburn, Senior Deputy Headteacher at the school and a 'Class of '93' alumna, gave a wonderful speech which gave a real sense of how special the school still is, as well as bringing back amusing memories of those school years (1986-1993).

Laughter accompanied her memories of 'the bun queue'; the move to the new building; Mrs Buchanan's sports car; the introduction of GCSEs; the roof blowing off the Geography block in the hurricane of 1987; the fire; the village of huts on the front field; the fundraising for, and the opening of, the Holdsworth wing; the school birthday and the insane competitiveness of the House system.

Emma highlighted that while the physical school has changed a lot, there are still core elements that have remained consistent over the years and that there is a clear continuum that runs from their time here to the present. She said:

"Tiffin girls are supportive of each other.

They seize the opportunities offered to them with both hands.

They are unashamedly academic and ambitious.

There is a really strong sense of community and support within the school.

You can see the strength of the friendships the students form. Many of them also have a perfectionist streak, worry too much, and are too prone to compare themselves to their peers.

I am sure some, if not all of that, will sound familiar to many of vou."

#### **CELEBRATION EVENINGS**

We have a wonderful tradition of alumnae returning to the school to celebrate the academic successes of our students at the end of Year 11 and Year 13. Their presence, words and support at this pivotal time shows appreciation of what it means to be a Tiffin girl and continuity in our vision to inspire young women to dare to be wise.





#### **Year 11 Celebration Evening - Melody Lam**

We were joined for the Year 11 evening by Melody Lam (1989-1996), who has spent much of her career working as a management consultant, working with a vast array of businesses and corporations and travelling regularly to work in the US and Europe.

She talked to students and parents about her experiences studying Mechanical Engineering at Imperial College London, as only one of eight female students on the course.

She reflected on the unconscious biases and, at times, outright discrimination that she had to face and overcome, not only at university but also in the workplace. She talked to students about the importance of representation, both at school and in later life quoting the American activist for civil rights, Marian Wright-Edelman, "You can't be what you can't see". While she is confident that society is taking positive steps forward, she also feels there is still a great deal to be done, and she hopes that our students can play an important role in that.

Melody told her audience that, while she left our school almost thirty years ago, she still considers herself a Tiffin girl. She reminded the students of all of the skills, knowledge, experiences and friendships they have acquired over the past five years, which will stand them in good stead for the next stages in their education and then working lives.

She also reflected on the importance of our school motto: sapere aude – dare to be wise. While this may mean that we dare to take on challenges, and to be curious and creative, she also emphasised that it can embody the courage to make the choices that are right for us at a particular time in our lives. For Melody, this has recently meant daring to take a step back from her corporate career and to explore other opportunities, such as working as a governor with local schools. Melody's speech was inspiring and also entertaining, and clearly resonated with our students.

#### Year 13 Leavers' Celebration Evening - Annabel Gillard

Alumna Annabel Gillard (1986-1993) joined us as our guest speaker at the Year 13 Leavers' Celebration Evening. After a career in investment management, Annabel is investigating the place of ethical values and organisational culture in an Al-driven future workplace, and its impact on the changing nature of work and society. She is also a trustee of the Support Tiffin Girls' School Company (STGSC).

Before congratulating the Year 13 leavers and presenting them with their A-Level certificates and prizes, she talked to them about her journey from her time at Tiffin Girls' to where she is today.

She gave motivational advice about the impact of enduring friendship such that she discovered at the school; 'making friends with change' and why the 'finding out' should be our lives' work especially in a world where change is accelerated though technology.

She also encouraged the former students to 'sit with discomfort' as this is a necessary precursor for growth and for the development of strength, resilience and learning. She concluded with the challenge to all former students to 'practice courage'. By practising and growing courage 'like a muscle' and by facing your fears, your world and your possibilities get bigger.

We will hold our first **Professional**Networking Event for alumnae in the financial sector in March.



# SPOTLIGHT: SARAH BEECHING (1981-1988) on climbing a mountain, the Africa Climate Summit and being Chair of The Tiffin Girls' School Board of Governors

"If you want something done, ask a busy person," goes the maxim. Which may be one of the reasons why Sarah Beeching was asked to be Chair of Governors of The Tiffin Girls' School. By anyone's standards, Sarah is a busy person.

In September, Sarah led the Africa Climate Summit for the President of Kenya, with 10,000 delegates including 20 Heads of African States, the Secretary-General of the United Nations and President of the European Commission, the summit saw 26 billion US dollars pledged for climate investments across the continent.



This came after she had spent a week climbing 5,895 metres to the top of Mount Kilimanjaro earlier in the summer, smashing her target to raise money for a sensory room for Yorda Adventures, a local charity.

Sarah runs her own consultancy company, <u>Oshun Partnership</u>, which she founded in 2011 to focus on bringing diplomacy to international development. Since then, she has led many international policy negotiations including delivering campaigns for the Global Partnership for Education, rabies elimination, sanitation and water for all, the Commonwealth Malaria Summit in London, and leading the G8 Nutrition for Growth Summit. She is a member of the Fellowship council (Advisory Board) for the Royal Society of Arts, an active campaigner on local and global issues and has lived and worked in over 70 countries. And is a mother of two! A typical Tiffin Girl!

Despite her busy schedule, Sarah gave up some time to be interviewed to talk about life at Tiffin Girls', her career, and being Chair of Governors.

I work trackside in Formula 4, Formula Regional, and Lamborghini Super Trofeo Asia, travelling the world and engineering race cars at the same time. I've often found myself to be one of the only women doing what I do, let alone one of the only students! I am currently on my gap year ahead of studying Motorsport Engineering (BEng) at Oxford Brookes University, one of the industry's most prestigious and competitive programmes for up-and-coming race engineers, having recently received an unconditional offer to study there."

Catherine Sedgwick is an alumna who, upon leaving in 1996 went on to study medicine and is currently working as an Endocrinology Registrar at Kingston Hospital. In her spare time she does silk screen printing and recently contacted us with exciting news she was rightly proud to share.

In November, she had a piece of artwork selected for the 2023 ING Discerning Eye Exhibition at Mall Galleries, London. Although the exhibition is now finished, it can be viewed online until 31 December 2023.

The exhibition was curated by a star-studded panel and Catherine's work was selected by Eliza Gluckman, Director, Government Art Collection. The other 2023 selectors were: Tony Adams (Former footballer and Collector), Chris Levine (Artist), Peju Oshin (Critic, Curator, Writer and Lecturer), Ian "H" Watkins (Singer and Collector), Julian Wild (Artist and Lecturer).



Out of 6,500 entries, 628 artworks by 387 creatives were shortlisted for this prestigious show. The ING Discerning Eye showcases talent in a wide range of media – painting, drawing, sculpture, print, photography, video, textile, ceramic and more. #### THE FIRE OF 2003 - As remembered by Lyra da Cruz

The most dramatic event in the history of The Tiffin Girls' School occurred on the evening of 15 December 2003 when a major fire swept through the roof and second floor of the main teaching block.

**Lyra da Cruz (1990-2012)** was a physics teacher and Assistant Head at the school at the time. Lyra had previously worked at Haberdashers and at Croydon High School. She loved the "warmth of Tiffin Girls' and the relationships between the staff and students."

She recalls that night in December and how with true to The Tiffin Girls' School character, the school community came together to ensure that the education of the girls barely missed a beat.



"It was December 15 and we were all at a carol concert in Kingston when we heard the news. The fire alarm went off at 8.41pm and the signal went straight to the fire brigade. We rushed to school and just stood watching the school being consumed. There were curtains crashing down and windows exploding. 23 fire engines attended the scene. Earlier that day Bettina Hunter, teacher, had reported that the lights had gone out in her classroom and as we later found out the fire was an electrical fault in the roof above that room 14.

Chris Norcott, the librarian, saved the rest of the school from burning down. She was known for religiously locking the library and it was this action that stopped the fire from spreading. Not one of the books was scorched. Every fire brigade manual now includes the story and shows a picture of Chris' door!

"After the fire, all of the staff worked incredibly hard. Pauline Cox, Headteacher at the time, used to sleep with a notepad by her bed. We were determined to get the girls back in to school as soon as possible. Ahead of its time, there were learning platforms on IT and temporary accommodation, or 'the Tiffin village' as it came to be known, of 20 classrooms craned in. Neighbours complained about the noise of the generators and the need for a 5am start for the cleaners. The dining hall and gymnasiums were also used as classrooms. There was a full day of education for all the students within six weeks."

In the months following the fire, the 'Fire Appeal' was established. It encapsulated the Tiffin Girls' spirit of determination and resilience. Students undertook charity challenges, there were craft fairs and dinners, an auction of promises, a lecture from David Attenborough, 'An Evening with...' which included supporters such as Jaqueline Wilson, Rory Bremner, Simon Hoggart and Lynne Truss, Sir Matthew Pinsent and Lawrence Dellaglio to name just a few.

The Holdsworth Wing, replacing the fire damaged section of the school was opened by Sandra Holdsworth, the retiring chair of governors.

They were also placed as first and fifth speakers overall. All six students debated brilliantly!






