THE EDUCATION SUPPORT FUND

A key development this term has been the launch of the 'Education Support Fund', initiated by the Support Tiffin Girls' School Company (STGSC). The trustees of the charity decided to designate some of these funds to helping families within our school community that are facing financial hardship. The fund is seeking to support students in the following areas:

- Curriculum trips and visits
- Uniform, shoes or PE kit
- Equipment (e.g. calculator or ingredients for cookery classes)
- Exceptional travel expenses to/from school

The information on the website can be found here it outlines both the eligibility criteria and application process. In addition, it's important to be aware that there are three submission dates for the academic year 2023/24: 31 October, 28 February and 31 May.

Please note, the Education Support Fund is completely separate from funding the school receives from the government in relation to pupil premium and sixth form bursaries.

This new fund reinforces the importance of the school's value of 'Community', making sure we collectively do all that we can to help those that need it most in the school. Therefore, enabling all students to access the same education experience irrespective of their financial status.
