

The winner of the Schools Geology Challenge 2024 is.....




The Tiffin Girls' School!

At the age of just 22, Ella Jarvis is excited to be producing her first play *Artificially Yours*, at the Riverside Studios in Hammersmith, London from Tuesday 9 April – Sunday 21 April starring Leslie Ash (Men Behaving Badly, Quadrophenia).

Written by her friend and Tiffin boy alumnus, Aaron Thakar, the play is described as "a gripping, dark-comedy that explores the hilarious and disturbing consequences of our society's increasing trust in Artificial Intelligence."

Ella, who will also be performing in the play, has been involved in acting since the age of 8. She won a drama scholarship to Surbiton High School at 11 but turned it down when she was offered a place at Tiffin Girls'. "I loved the drama department and I was also interested in the academic side so it was an obvious choice for me".

While at school, Ella threw herself into the drama productions. *Alice in Wonderland* was a particular highlight. "Chloe Hunkin was Alice and I played the Duchess, Mock turtle and auntie. Miss Smith was directing it and it was brilliant."

It was while she was at Tiffin Girls' that Ella met Aaron Thakar. "He played Romeo in a joint Tiffin Girls' and Tiffin Boys' production of *Romeo and Juliet* and we just became great friends." Ella left Tiffin Girls' after GCSEs to study A-Level drama at another school, but she still came back to see the school production of *Chicago* and support her friend and now playwright, Jen Tucker, who is also stage managing *Artificially Yours*.

Ella went straight into the acting industry after A-Levels and she has been very busy ever since. She has worked for casting directors, talent agents, undertook a course at Oxford School of Drama, set up a showreel company, *Parkhouse Showreels*, written film and TV scripts. She has also appeared in several films including *A gift from Bob* in 2020, *The Kindred* in 2021 and *A Midsummer Night's Dream* released in 2022 with Robert Lindsay as Oberon, Tyger Drew-Honey as Demetrius and Black Panther's Florence Kasumba as Hippolyta.





Now, for the first time, she is producing a play which she also script edited. "As soon as Aaron first mentioned the concept for this play I was in love," says Ella. "It's brilliantly written, so clever and funny." With her encouragement, Aaron developed the idea from a few scenes to a whole play which is already attracting a lot of interest thanks to the topical subject matter and the starry cast.

Ella says: "We hope that the journey of *Artificially Yours* isn't finished yet; we would love to try and take the play somewhere else, perhaps on tour or to another venue. Aaron and I are also starting development for a new play, keep an eye out for that one! On a more personal note, I am aiming to film my directorial screen debut in the next couple of years and am writing that now."

Professor Christine Lee

We were delighted that Professor Christine Lee (1954-1961) came to speak at the Medics conference organised by the Deputy Head Girls for students from local schools.

Her speech to the delegates was a highlight of the day.

Here she talks a bit about her life and fascinating career as a haematologist.



"I'd wanted to do medicine right from the time I came to The Tiffin Girls' School. This was partly thanks to our family GP who was somebody called Dr Swann (the father of Donald Swann, one half of comedy and musical duo Flanders & Swann). He had escaped at the end of the Russian revolution from St Petersburg and had to semi retrain at St Mary's and after working in the East End eventually he came to Richmond.

"He was a very good doctor and I respected him. Then I was good at biology and sciences and maths at school so, you know, it was a no brainer really. I can remember being taught about the formation of a blood clot in biology in the 2nd form and being so interested I went to the Richmond library to read more about it in the Encyclopedia Britannica.

"Some things that stand out about Tiffin Girls': There was a wonderful classics mistress called Miss Wallis who taught us English as well. She was our form mistress in the fourth form and she was amazing. And we had a wonderful history mistress called Mrs Berryman who was very, very left wing and that was good. We had penfriends for French and we did a French exchange. I went to Lille and became very good friends with my pen friend. I am still in touch with her daughter.

"I enjoyed sport and was in the hockey team. I loved it but had to give it up in the sixth form. I was doing four A-Levels and it was just too much. I was tired. Our headteacher, Miss Orford, was not impressed and thought I was letting the school down. I later discovered I was very anaemic which explained why I was so tired and another reason why I find haematology so interesting.

"I was Head Girl, but in those days far fewer girls stayed on in the sixth form or went to university. There were three sixth forms: six arts, six general and six science. Six science was very small, I think there were about eight people in it. The idea was that you became a nurse, a secretary or a teacher.

"I left Tiffin Girls' in 1961 and went to Somerville College in Oxford in October 1962 initially to read biochemistry but I changed subjects to medicine at the end of the first year. Before that, I had a friend at the Royal Postgraduate Hammersmith Hospital and so I wrote to them and asked them for a job and went to work in the haematology lab there for 8 months. It was fantastic training and I earned £10 a week!"

"In 1969, I qualified from Oxford Medical School at the old Radcliffe Infirmary (where she was awarded First Class Honours and was the first female scholar of the Oxford University Medical School).

"My first house job was at the Hammersmith doing renal medicine which was interesting and then I went on to do a number of different medical jobs in London as well as training as a GP for a year at an estate in Wembley.

"I think there was definitely sexism in medicine at that time. For example, I had thought at one stage that I might want to be a surgeon but there was only one female surgeon working in the Radcliffe Infirmary and I was told it was no job for a woman. When I was a medical student, people would assume I was a nurse and the sister-in-charge of the wards would make your life very difficult. On the other hand, because there were so few women in medicine, it was easier to shine because you stood out.

"I met my husband at the Brompton Hospital and we had two children. I was lucky that there was a scheme which would allow part-time working. My professional life culminated as a consultant haematologist and director of the Royal Free Haemophilia Centre from 1987-2005. Although I was an NHS clinician providing a clinical service I was involved in clinical research and directed 18 postgraduate doctors for MD and PhD degrees. I retired as a consultant haematologist in 2005 and although I continued academically I retired from medicine completely in 2013. I founded the peer review journal Haemophilia, now in the 30th year of publication.

"My areas of expertise were in transfusion transmitted disease, particularly HIV and HCV, and women with inherited bleeding disorders. During the last five years I have responded to criticism from the infected blood inquiry and I was interrogated by a QC in October 2020. The Infected Blood Inquiry's final report will be published on 20 May 2024.

"I found great inspiration at the medics conference hosted by Tiffin girls, listening to fellow alumnae share their career journeys. The outlook for medicine is promising, especially with the potential of Artificial Intelligence to enhance disease detection and aid in finding cures."



"To current students at Tiffin Girls', my advice is simple: Keep pushing forward and never lose hope!"

The Medics Conference 2024



Organised by our community Deputy Head Girls, Piriyankaa and Izzy, we hosted students from eight nearby secondary schools at our second Medics Conference.

Attendees received a package of materials to aid them in preparing for a medical school application. They also had the opportunity to listen to various speakers, including current students and alumnae.

The panel consisted of two students from Imperial College, Zahra and Rasha, a general practitioner, a consultant pediatrician, and Professor Christine Lee (see our profile piece in this issue) who shared her insights on practical medicine and research. Additionally, Monica, a former Deputy Head Girl who arranged the conference last year, spoke about her current studies in medicine at Oxford University.

Career and higher education talks

During this term, former students returned to the school to address Year 12 students:

- Dr. Sahana Gnanasampanthan shared her journey from medical school to working as a junior doctor.
- Kasia Proctor, who graduated from The Tiffin Girls' School in 2018, pursued Economics at Durham University. She is currently employed at PwC through the Graduate Business Programme. Kasia has gained experience in various teams within the company, including Audit, Consulting, Deals, and Tax. She now focuses on the Sustainability team, assisting companies in enhancing their environmental and social responsibilities. Her responsibilities involve crafting ESG (Environmental, Social, Governance) strategies, aiding companies in achieving net zero, and advising on nature conservation.
