Adriana climbs into history

It is with enormous pride that we congratulate Adriana Brownlee (class of 2019) who has made history as the youngest woman in the world to scale all <u>14 of the world's highest peaks</u>, each standing over 8,000 metres.

In 'Alumnae News' back in summer 2021 we announced Adriana had become the second youngest woman ever to reach the summit of Mount Everest and had declared her goal of scaling all 14 summits. Adriana and her team reached the 8,027m summit of Shishapangma in Tibet on October 9th, completing this extraordinary feat.

At just 23 years old, Adriana is only the second British climber and one of just 64 people globally to have achieved this incredible milestone. After leaving Tiffin Girls' in 2019, Adriana began a degree at Bath University but made the bold decision to leave and pursue her passion for mountaineering. Her inspiring journey is a testament to following your own path. Adriana says, "I hope to inspire young people all over the world that there is no set path in life."

We are so proud of her perseverance, courage, and trailblazing spirit. Congratulations, Adriana!

Lorna Watson (class of 1995)

Lorna is best known for her role as Sister Boniface in the British television series Sister Boniface Mysteries. The light-hearted detective drama, set in the 1960s, is a spinoff of Father Brown, and features Watson as a crime-solving nun with a background in forensics and a penchant for using her scientific skills to solve mysteries.

She is also well known for her work as a comedian and actress in various British television programs, including appearances in Watson & Oliver, a sketch comedy show she co-created with Ingrid Oliver.

Fond Memories of Tiffin Girls'

Lorna speaks warmly of her school days. "I had such a lovely time and have very fond memories," she says noting how much laughter marked her time at Tiffin. "We worked incredibly hard, but we had so much laughter too. Some of my closest friends today are the ones I made at school."

Her connection to the school remains strong; she has visited several times, including returning with comedy partner Ingrid Oliver to speak at a Celebration Evening for students. Most recently, she attended the TOGA reunion in June after which she met up with her form teacher and French teacher, Janice Kent, who went to meet her on the set while she was filming last summer. "It was great. We chatted for about 5 hours non-stop! I think we had a sandwich to eat – but I don't think I even took a mouthful!"

Comedy Beginnings with Ingrid Oliver

One of Lorna's enduring school friendships is with Ingrid Oliver, her co-creator and co-star of the 2012 TV sketch series Watson & Oliver. Ingrid joined Tiffin Girls' in Year 9 from the German School nearby, and the two bonded over a shared sense of humour. "We weren't in the same form, but we took the same subjects and hit it off." Ingrid lived just up the road from school, so we spent a lot of time together going to her house. Both pursued languages at university, with Ingrid studying Italian and German at Oxford, while Lorna took French and German at Edinburgh.

Drama Days at Tiffin

Drama was always a passion for Lorna. She vividly recalls GCSE Drama classes with Miss Flatly and throwing herself into school productions. "I tried to get in them all," she laughs. "Katherine Parkinson [actress, The IT Crowd, Doc Martin, Rivals] was in my class," Lorna reminisces. "We both played zombies in a school production of Dracula. Neither of us had any lines—we just made zombie noises. When it was time for the curtain call and our bow, we realised we were so far out we were actually in the wings offstage!" Lorna recently reached out to congratulate Katherine on her stellar performance in Jilly Cooper's Rivals. "She was brilliant." Katherine, like Ingrid, went to Oxford, so their paths often cross.



A Thriving Acting Career

From those early zombie roles, Lorna's career has flourished. In addition to Watson & Oliver, her credits include Rush Hour, The Wrong Door, and The Catherine Tate Show. She's also danced to Ravel's Bolero on Let's Dance for Sport Relief and played Boudicca on Horrible Histories. Most recently, she has embraced the role of Sister Boniface in the BBC's 1960s-set cosy mystery series.

The character of Sister Boniface—a Catholic nun, scooter rider, wine maker, and part-time forensic advisor—was originally a minor figure in Father Brown. "I thought it was a one-off," says Lorna, "but 10 years later, I got a call saying they wanted to create a whole series around her. It came at just the right time."




Although the role requires scientific dialogue, Lorna laughs about her lack of expertise. "I'm scientifically challenged! I have no idea what I'm saying, but I love the lab I get to work in on set. It's full of Bunsen burners and I do feel like I'm learning something!" Filming in the Cotswolds has also become a much enjoyed and eagerly anticipated aspect of her life. "I really look forward to it every year. I love the cast, crew, and whole production team. Also, playing a group of nuns I think helps to create a very calm set. It's such a joy."

Singing the School song loudly in Sheffield Mary Ward (Hood) (class of 1948)

Remembers The Tiffin Girls' School during WWII

On a rare sunny day in November, Development Manager Naia Edwards had the privilege of visiting Mary Ward (née Hood), a former student of The Tiffin Girls' School, at her home in Crowborough, East Sussex. Mary, who attended the school from 1941 to 1948, shared vivid memories of her time there during the Second World War, complete with school photographs and tales of her life after school.



Joining Tiffin Girls' School

Mary joined The Tiffin Girls' School in 1941, and was put in the X stream specifically for students who had been evacuated. Mary herself was evacuated twice: first to Berkshire during the blitz which delayed her entry to the school, and later to Sheffield during the dangerous months of the doodlebug raids (June–December 1944).

Joining late was intimidating, Mary recalls, and she required special French lessons to catch up. Her second evacuation, to a mixed school in Sheffield, initially felt like an adventure, but the novelty of the attention from boys quickly wore off. She missed her friends in Kingston upon Thames and even sang the Tiffin School song proudly at her temporary school in Sheffield during their speech day when they were singing their own school song!

Life During the War

The war years were frightening, especially after France fell to the Germans, but Mary remembers everyone keeping a "stiff upper lip." Fear was something unspoken. Practical adaptations to wartime were also a part of school life. Showers, for example, were forbidden during the war in case of air raids; they resumed after the war after PE lessons. Mary recalls that her PE teacher, Miss Bomford, insisted students wait until the end of the lesson to shower, often making them late for their next class!

Rationing affected everything, even Domestic Science lessons. Students had to choose between cooking and needlework or embroidery and art. The limited supplies often made cooking lessons an exercise in creativity. Mary recounts a mischievous moment when her class added odd ingredients to a casserole destined for the teachers' lunch—thankfully, no one seemed to notice! Mary opted for art, which she loved, studying it for the Higher School Certificate alongside English and Biology.

School Rules and Rebellion

Mary notes that the majority of students left school at 14 or 16, which was standard at the time (the leaving age was raised to 15 in the 1944 Education Act). Only about 30 girls stayed on for the sixth form. Sixth formers were required to wear school uniforms and remain on school premises, though Mary and her friends occasionally bent the rules. One favourite illicit excursion was walking by the river to the Half Mile Tree, a thrill that fortunately went unnoticed by the staff.



Mary Ward (continued)....

For those aspiring to university, studying Latin was a legal requirement, but the war's disruptions meant no Latin teacher was available until the sixth form. Students hoping to attend university had to cram seven years of Latin into just two or spend three years in the sixth form. This requirement was lifted after the 1947 Education Act, but many girls chose teacher training colleges instead. Mary initially considered teaching but changed her mind after serving as a prefect for a particularly unruly class – form 1V B, deciding the career wasn't for her!

Mary fondly remembers her close-knit group of friends, including Wendy Lane, who had cerebral palsy, excelled academically, and later became a French teacher after studying at Exeter University. Another friend, Marian Aldred, was a talented academician and athlete.

The students visited Downing Street as finalists of the competition where they met the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Rachel Reeves.


Their essay, which argued the economic impact of the growing gig economy, will be published in the Financial Times in December.

Alumnae return to school: Careers

TiffinTalks

Earlier in this edition we spoke about the impact of School's TiffinTalk programme. We are so grateful to the alumnae who give their time to inform and inspire our current Tiffin girls.

Architecture

Our autumn series of TiffinTalks kicked off in October with three TOGS talking to the students about their careers in architecture and design.

Kamola Askarova (class of 2012) studied at the Barlett School of Architecture, UCL and completed her masters degree at the Royal College of Art. She currently works as an architect at Hawkins\Brown Architects, working largely on commercial and education projects. She has previously worked at Facebook as an in-house event production designer and an events construction firm, Firecracker works, as a production designer. She has also designed and built fashion shows and sets in a freelance capacity.

Georgia Roberts (class of 2012) went to study Architecture at the University of Nottingham. She then completed her Masters and Professional Qualifications at the University of Westminster, qualifying as an Architect in 2021. She now works as an Architect at Studio PDP in London.

Lola Leforestier (class of 2020) has recently completed her degree in architecture at the University of Bath, and has a particular interest in how architecture can be used as a bridge between asylum seekers and the local community.

Dentistry

In November, Jade Su (2009-2016) gave a fantastic account of her dentistry career so far including details of the different pathways available to her at each step. After leaving school, she went on to complete her dental degree at Leeds Dental Institute and then did her dental foundation training in Surrey working as a General dental practitioner before completing dental core training as a doctor in oral and maxillofacial surgery.

Jade spoke very interestingly and informatively about her motivations for choosing different career options, and then gave examples of the work that she currently does in her role as a hospital-based dentist providing Special Care Dentistry to adults and children with special needs.

Good changing facilities play a vital role in encouraging girls to participate in sports. They provide privacy, safety, and hygiene, helping girls feel comfortable and respected.


